In the case of moral agency, this territory includes the existence and nature of moral values and norms, how they are known, and how they are achieved. First, as with most practitioners in evolutionary psychology, Rottschaefer assumes at the outset that moral capacities are products of evolution, and in particular natural selection. For a biological theory of moral agency to have any meaning, they assume, the moral capacity must have had some utility or advantage in our remote past.
